#### Conference Tracks

The interconnected domains of the Whole Leadership Framework guide tracks for the 2018 Leadership Connections™ National Conference.



Whole leadership is an inter-dependent relationship that exists between the domains of administrative leadership, pedagogical leadership, and leadership essentials, as identified in the Whole Leadership Framework. A balanced perspective is necessary when performing administrative functions.

**ADMINISTRATIVE LEADERSHIP** is about setting goals, orchestrating work, and mobilizing people to sustain an early childhood organization. Effective administrative leaders establish systems for consistent implementation of program operations to meet the needs of children, families, and staff. There are many important aspects of administrative leadership, with two of the most important being operational leadership and strategic leadership.

**PEDAGOGICAL LEADERSHIP** attends to educator dispositions and high-quality interactions with children, such as ensuring fidelity to curricular philosophy, assessing children's development and learning, using data for evaluation, and optimizing learning. It is inclusive of instructional leadership.


**LEADERSHIP ESSENTIALS** include the personal skills and attributes on which administrative and pedagogical leadership are built. The competencies influence and motivate all other areas of leadership vision and practice. Leadership essentials are embodied by the leader as necessary anchors for success.



#### Opening Keynote Luncheon | Thursday, May 10



#### Walter S. Gilliam

Walter S. Gilliam is the Director of The Edward Zigler Center in Child Development and Social Policy and Associate Professor of Child Psychiatry and Psychology at the Yale University Child Study Center. Dr. Gilliam is a member of the board of directors for ZERO TO THREE, Child Care Aware of America, and the Irving Harris Foundation; a research fellow of the National Institute for Early Education Research; and former Senior Advisor to the National Association for the Education of Young Children. Dr. Gilliam is co-recipient of the prestigious

2008 Grawemeyer Award in Education for the coauthored book A *Vision for Universal Preschool Education*. His scholarly writing addresses early childhood care and education programs, school readiness, and developmental assessment of young children. His work frequently has been covered in major national and international news outlets, and he actively provides consultation to state and federal decision-makers in the United States and other countries.

#### Closing Luncheon Keynote | Saturday, May 12



#### Dana Suskind

Dr. Dana Suskind is a Professor of Surgery at the University of Chicago; Director of the Pediatric Cochlear Implant Program, and Founder and Director of the Thirty Million Words® Initiative, a program dedicated to harnessing the power of language to build a child's brain and impact his or her future. Dr. Suskind is also the author of *Thirty Million Words: Building a Child's Brain*, published in September 2015.

In her book and keynote presentations, Dr. Suskind details the critical importance of early language exposure on a developing child's brain and encourages parents to

take an active role in this development. Drawing on her own experiences with patients and the compelling research on the neuroscience of brain plasticity, Dr. Suskind explains that the most important, and astoundingly simple, thing that one can do for a child's future success in life is to talk to him or her.

Dr. Suskind and the Thirty Million Words® Initiative have been profiled by numerous media outlets, including the New York Times, NPR, The Economist, and Slate.com and they have received support from The Department of Education and The Hemera Foundation. She also received the University of Chicago Medical Faculty Award for "Distinguished Leader in Program Innovation." Dr. Suskind lives in Chicago with her family.

# 2018 Visionary Leadership Award Recipient and Leadership Colloquium Speaker



#### Barbara T. Bowman

Barbara T. Bowman is a pioneer in the field of early childhood. Throughout her career, she has been an advocate for young children, applying knowledge about child development to her work integrating policy and practice. She is an internationally renowned expert, delivering speeches and lectures and holding local, national, and international leadership positions.

Her understanding of how young children learn and how culture shapes their worldview was forged through her own life, including her time spent at boarding

school in Massachusetts, college experience in New York, graduate school education at the University of Chicago, six years living in Iran, one year living in Great Britain, and the last 50 years traveling and working throughout the United States and the world.

In 1965, Bowman co-founded the Erikson Institute to provide leadership training for Head Start teachers, social workers, nurses, and other staff working with young children. Throughout Erikson's history, Bowman has been integral in both its leadership and day-to-day operations, serving at various points as vice president, president, and a board member. Currently, she teaches graduate students as the Irving B. Harris Professor of Child Development and serves as co-principal investigator of a project aimed at improving child-parent centers across three states.

For her, interacting with Erikson students is one of the most rewarding parts of her job. Through her teaching, she challenges students to think critically. Bowman asks her students to reflect on their own culture and life experiences as they try to understand and relate to the children and families different from themselves. Reflection is a core part of an Erikson education and Bowman notes that it is important in helping future early childhood leaders deepen their knowledge and skills.

As Erikson grew, new research, new theories, and new practices have changed the content of its work. What has not changed is the focus on early childhood and the vision of Bowman and the other founders that all children deserve high-quality care and education. More than ever, Bowman has played a leadership role in local, national, and international arenas, influencing the well-being of children and families around the world.

For eight years, Bowman served as chief officer for early childhood education for the Chicago Public Schools, and during the first term of former President Barack Obama, she served as a consultant to the U.S. Secretary of Education. Today, she works to strengthen programs for young children and families by serving on numerous boards and committees, including the Chicago Public Library and the Great Books Foundation. Additionally, she writes and presents at conferences, addressing issues such as the "cradle to prison pipeline" and the need for systematic changes to ensure equitable opportunities for low-income and minority children.

#### Public Policy Forum | Friday, May 11



#### Teri Talan

Teri N. Talan is the Michael W. Louis Chair and Senior Policy Advisor to the McCormick Center for Early Childhood Leadership and Professor of Early Childhood Education at National Louis University. She is a passionate voice for the McCormick Center's call to action: Leadership Matters — Invest in Leaders. She promotes action by state and national policymakers on early childhood workforce, leadership development, and program administration issues. She holds a law degree from Northwestern University, as well as an Ed.D. in Adult and Continuing Education and M.Ed. in Early Childhood Education from National Louis University.

Dr. Talan's research interests are in the areas of leadership, workforce development, systems integration, and program quality evaluation. She is co-author of the *Program Administration Scale* (PAS), *Business Administration Scale for Family Child Care* (BAS), and the reports, *Who's Caring for the Kids? The Status of the Early Childhood Workforce in Illinois, Taking Charge of Change: A 20-Year Review of Empowering Early Childhood Administrators through Leadership Training, and Closing the Leadership Gap: 2017 Status Report on Early Childhood Program Leadership in the United States.* 



#### Marica Cox Mitchell

Marica Cox Mitchell is responsible for NAEYC's major program efforts in early childhood program and higher education accreditation. She is also leading the alignment among and between the Center for Applied Research, accreditation, and higher education with early childhood and higher education systems across the country. Mitchell has been in the early childhood education field for more than 16 years and has worked in both administrative and classroom settings. Before assuming her current role, she served as the Director of Higher Education Accreditation for NAEYC. Prior to this position, she led the Early Childhood

Professional Development Unit at the District of Columbia Office of the State Superintendent of Education where she developed and monitored a wide range of professional development resources designed to increase the quality of early learning programs and advance cohorts of early childhood professionals. These resources included the TEACH Early Childhood DC scholarship program, DC Career Guide for Early Childhood and Out of School Time Professionals, DC Trainer Approval Program, and accreditation facilitation projects.

Mitchell began her early childhood professional journey working in early childhood programs as a teacher assistant, teacher, and curriculum specialist. These diverse experiences and perspectives inspired her to focus on advancing professional practice and recognition. Mitchell holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Early Childhood Education from the University of the District of Columbia and a Master's of Science degree in Educational Administration from the University of Scranton.



#### Anne Douglass

Anne Douglass, PhD., is Associate Professor and Program Director of the Bachelor's Degree and Post Masters Certificate Programs in Early Care and Education. She is the founding executive director of the Institute for Early Education Leadership and Innovation at UMass Boston. Her teaching and research focus on child care quality improvement, policy, professional development, and leadership. She studies relational organizational systems, and how they contribute to early educators' capacity to improve teaching practices and partnerships with families. Her leadership work is dedicated to the design of programs, systems, and policies

that support individual and collective leadership for improvement and innovation among early educators. Her research has been published in a wide range of academic journals, and she presents nationally and internationally at academic, policy, and professional meetings. She received her PhD from the Heller School for Social Policy at Brandeis University, her master's degree in education from the Harvard University Graduate School of Education, and her bachelor's degree in political science from Wellesley College.

Dr. Douglass brings almost 20 years of expertise as an urban early educator to this work, as a teacher, administrator, family child care owner and educator, professional development trainer, and organizational improvement consultant. Her two decades of experience as a practitioner working directly with children, families, and teachers informs her deep respect for the expertise of early educators, and has shaped the focus of her research and teaching in higher education.



#### Sherry Cleary

Sherry M. Cleary is the Executive Director of the New York City Early Childhood Professional Development Institute, which is housed at the City University of New York. She leads the work of a dynamic, intelligent, and passionate team dedicated to building essential systems to ensure a highly effective early childhood workforce for the state of New York, to guarantee that young children have access to excellence. Some hallmarks of the vision and leadership that Sherry has brought to New York include collaborative efforts to create New York Works for Children (New York's early childhood workforce development system), a new competency-based Core Body of

Knowledge, Early Learning Guidelines (Birth to Age 5), the completion of the NYS Trainer Credential, ASPIRE – NYS' workforce registry, and oversight for the implementation of New York's quality rating and improvement system, QUALITYstarsNY. She co-chairs the Governor's Early Childhood Advisory Council, for the state of New York, and co-chairs its Work Force Work Group. She is also the President-Elect of the New York State Association of Early Childhood Teacher Educators (NYSAECTE) and has presided over the group in the past. Most recently, Sherry was named to Mayor de Blasio's 6-member Early Childhood Working Group, initially charged with building the model to be used for a Universal Pre-kindergarten implementation in New York City.
